As an Emergency Room Technician I was responsible for obtaining vascular access, triaging patients arriving in the Emergency room, obtaining EKGs, blood work for labs, performing CPR, and preparing patients for cardiac and stroke alert work ups. I was also responsible for assisting in various procedures such as spinal taps, blood transfusions, and any other emergency procedures deemed necessary by the ED providers.

During my time in New York I worked alongside Nurses, Doctors and Respiratory Therapists in the Intensive Care Unit and assisted 6 days per week, 12 hours per day. My duties included compressions during codes, titrating medications using IV pumps, administering medications through gastric tubes, charting patient information, taking vitals, restraining altered patients, and obtaining labs through arterial lines and/or venipuncture. Essentially our role was to assist in an overloaded healthcare system in any way we could.

My duties included instructing Wilderness First Aid, Wilderness First Responder and Wilderness EMT courses, as well as regular EMT refreshers.

Volunteer Fire Fighter- 4/1/2020 – 4/1/2021

Lefthand Fire Department- Boulder, CO

While working for Lefthand Fire Department I am responsible for the safe operation of chainsaws, falling trees next to homes using ropes, pulleys and climbing gear, assessing and mitigating fire danger in residential and mountainous areas, and removing fuels to fit forest prescriptions. In addition to full time work, I also volunteer with the department and assist in running medical calls in the district as an EMT. I am expected to respond to wildfire incidents within the district as well as national dispatches.

Ski Patroller 11/2017 to 1/21

Eldora Mountain Ski Resort – Nederland, CO

As a member of the Medical, Snow Safety and Lift Evacuation specialist teams I was responsible for

medical inventories, teaching continuing education topics, checking off other EMT and OEC staff on medical skills, and training staff on rescue techniques such as tower climbing and rappelling. Other responsibilities include treatment and extrication of patients in a remote setting, avalanche control work and ski resort safety. Snowmobile operation, radio use, rope rescue and first aid are all necessary skills used in this position.

Wilderness Medics 3/2018 to Present

As an EMT working for Wilderness Medics I am responsible for working with wildland firefighters and responding, extricating and treating injured parties in a remote and potentially dangerous setting.

River Guide, Medical Lead 6/2018-10/2019

Splore and The National Ability Center- Moab, Utah

While working for Splore and The National Ability Center I was responsible for the wellbeing of guests with varying levels of disabilities on multi-day river trips through extremely remote sections of the Colorado River. It was my job to navigate high consequence rapids with special needs populations of all ability levels and respond to any medical needs that might arise on the expedition.

Wilderness Ranger Intern 5/17/16 to 8/20/16

Selway Bitterroot Frank Church Foundation- Deep Creek, ID

Living in a backcountry ranger station in Idaho I used primitive tools such as axes and crosscut saws to maintain trails in the largest wilderness in the lower 48, the Frank Church River of No Return. I was responsible for guiding volunteer trips as well as working with a trail crew. Our station was so remote that we received groceries by plane. We were self-sufficient and solved any problems with whatever tools we had around us.

Wilderness Steward Intern 5/20/15 to 8/23/15

Bob Marshall Wilderness Foundation- Hungry Horse, MT

Working in partnership with the US Forest Service I was provided the opportunity to make and maintain trails as a member of a work crew, use GPS systems to document the spread of invasive species, and guide a crew of volunteers all while dealing with the unique challenges associated with working in a Wilderness Area. We would often clear up to 15 or more miles of trail per day using non-mechanized tools such as crosscut saws and axes. I have experience meal planning for a backpacking crew for 8 day hitches with or without pack/stock support. This internship involved working closely with rangers of the

five different districts in the 1.5 million acre Bob Marshall Wilderness Complex on varying tasks according to the specific rangers priorities and needs.
